

Chairman's message



Greetings from CSMVS, Mumbai!

I am delighted to present our Annual Review for 2018–2019. The year under review may be considered particularly crucial given the international collaborative initiatives, exhibitions and development projects the most important among them being the CSMVS Children's Museum. The city's first Children's Museum opened to the public on 29th March 2019 with an inaugural ceremony conducted by the young curators of its first exhibition titled 'Footsteps...to Framing the Future'. Curated by 25 bright young minds, the exhibition has displayed an eclectic range of art objects re-interpreted by the children through their unique point of view to represent values that the world needs for a better tomorrow.

The construction of the Children's Museum was completed by December 2018. The Museum has been designed by Rahul Mehrotra. Nestled in a grove of trees, including a rare 95-year-old Baobab, the space has integrated within its design three magnificent trees, spotlighting CSMVS' commitment to environmental preservation. The peripheral greenery has been carefully laid out by the landscape designer Urmila Rajadhyaksha. Every aspect of the Children's Museum, including the exhibition, was carefully designed over the past year, keeping in mind children's access and experiential needs.

The year also witnessed the centenary commemoration of Sir Ratan Tata — the Museum will forever be grateful for his magnificent bequest. An exhibition titled 'An Exotic Encounter' displayed foreign treasures from the Sir Ratan Tata Art Collection at CSMVS, celebrating the world cultures represented at the Museum. A series of allied programmes including a commemorative lecture delivered by Mr Neil MacGregor, a Bharatanatyam recital, and educational programmes were organised at the Museum.

The Annual Review carries an illustrated report of museum activities, research, development and finance during the year under review.

On behalf of the Trustees and staff of the Museum, I extend our heartfelt gratitude to Citi, Bank of America, Tata Trusts, and the enlightened individual donors to the Museum for their continued support and encouragement. I also thank the Director General and his team for their continued dedication to CSMVS.

I am sure you will find the 9th issue of the Museum Annual Review as informative as the previous ones.



xamination, documentation and technical studies

Once an object is received by the art onservator, its condition is examined. This examination helps to determine what is the cause of the damage, so hat an appropriate treatment can be given to the object to make it 'healthy' once again. All observations, treatment processes, materials employed, are documented for future reference and ecords.

A stereo-microscope is a very helpful ool to examine an object as well as to reat an object while observing it under magnification. Ultraviolet fluorescence is employed to investigate the presence of varnishes as they glow in UV light. Infrared rays penetrate the surface of paintings so we can see the drawings under the images. X-ray images of objects help reveal the damage inside the object.

Certain chemicals may react with particular elements. To ensure that there is no adverse effect of chemicals selected for the treatment, the elemental composition of the object is first confirmed using techniques such as spectrometry. It also helps to investigate fakes and forgeries.



New Acquisitions

CSMVS collections have been built over the years from varied sources such as archaeological artefacts from excavated sites, through purchases by the Trustees of the Museum, and generous bequests from patrons and collectors. The Museum receives bequests each year from its patrons who wish to share their histories with the public. Patrons may also choose to provide a collection on short/long-term loan to the Museum. The bequests are accepted through a Committee, and upon acceptance are verified for authenticity, documented and catalogued, and conserved (if need be) before being carefully placed in the Museum's well-equipped storage units. The bequeathed collection is then studied in further detail towards research and exhibition objectives.

Archives

The Archives and Documentation department of CSMVS functions as a source for the Museum's individual collections, as well as the Museum's own infrastructural, cultural and economic histories. To this aim, the department is involved in the CSMVS Centenary project supported by the TCS Foundation titled Upgradation and Digitization of Museum Collection and Archival Research (2019–2022) leading varied initiatives of archiving, documentation of the Museum collection, supply of images, and an Oral History project.

Documentation of the Museum collections

In 2018–19 a total of 1,296 exhibits were photographed which include objects from the Art section, Archaeology section, Natural History section and Miniature and Manuscript section. Collections that are photographed and digitised are periodically uploaded on a dedicated database software hosted by the Museum called JATAN. The Archives department is also responsible for documenting new acquisitions, exhibitions, and major events.



Supply of images

The Archives department regularly supplies high- and low-resolution images of collections on request to scholars, students and researchers, for use in publications, research projects, exhibitions, conservation, educational activities, etc. The Museum waives or offers a concession to the fee to young and self-funded students should they not be able to afford access otherwise, thereby supporting young scholarship. In 2018 the Museum shared 168 images from its collections for wider publishing and use.



Oral History Project

The Archives department has been sourcing and collecting information and narratives from former employees, experts, historians and scholars from Mumbai in order to be able to record the rich history of the institution and document its legacy. This endeavour has been undertaken as the Oral History Project that aims to build a resource bank for parallel histories of the city and the making of the Museum. Using presently available print data, the aim is to enrich histories and capture key transitions of the time and how they were reflected in the intuition's 100-year journey. The first interview was conducted with the former director of the Museum Sadashiv Gorakshkar.

CSMVS Museum Art Conservation Centre

The CSMVS Museum Art Conservation Centre

(CSMVS MACC) aims to spearhead heritage conservationrestoration, research and development and training activities in India as well as in other nations in the region through its work, as well as by encouraging collaboration and sharing of expertise.

Condition assessments of numerous objects both at the Museum as well as for objects being loaned and received from other institutions were conducted over the year. Regular collection care of objects in the various galleries was implemented by the conservation team in tandem with the curatorial teams.

ConservArte: Citi-CSMVS Art Conservation Project (Phase II) Following the successful implementation of ConservArte Phase I (2015–18), the centre has now completed year 1 (2018–2019) of Phase II of the project (2018–2023).

Over the next five years the storage will be upgraded for at least 20,000 objects across 4 storage zones in the CSMVS. Post Graduate Diploma in Museology and Conservation affiliated to the University of Mumbai

The CSMVS introduced the Post Graduate Diploma in Museology and Conservation affiliated to the University of Mumbai in 2009-2010 with the aim to impart best museum practices and create a body of critically thinking and creative prospective museum professionals. The course admits 20 students annually. Lectures and practical sessions are conducted at the Museum by members of staff and visiting faculty along with study tours to explore a diverse range of museums. Study tours this year were organised to the Bhau Daji Laud City Museum, Godrej Archives and Nehru Science Centre in Mumbai and Shanti-Krishna Museum of Money and History and the Artillery Museum in Nashik. Students of the course also present an exhibition as a culmination of their learning through the year and this year they curated, designed and displayed an exhibition titled 'On The Rocks: Rocks, Minerals, Fossils' based on the Museum's collection which was on display from 2nd to 30th April 2019.

Courses

The 6th Capacity Development Diploma Programme in Built Heritage Studies and Conservation (BHSC) 2018–2019

This programme is a visionary effort to enhance learning in the field of built heritage conservation, through a modular diploma programme. Through a series of workshops, the BHSC programme offers hands-on experience in various areas of conservation such as documentation, condition assessment, knowledge of building and decorative materials, structural conservation, heritage management and urban conservation. The programme is open to contractors, artisans, construction workers who are engaged with conservation, persons with experience of heritage conservation works, senior students or internship candidates of architecture, planning, civil and structural engineering who demonstrate a strong desire to work in the field of conservation and conservation enthusiasts. Its modular nature also allows inservice personnel, engineers and others from Government organisations to attend particular sections of the course. The programme is conducted by CSMVS and Sir J.J. College of Architecture, and supported by the Mumbai Metropolitan Region Heritage Conservation Society (MMR-HCS).

In its 6th cycle, the Diploma Programme comprised the following modules:

Module I: 24–28 September 2018 (Participants 28) Material Conservation I – Lime Plaster, Stone, Stucco

Module II: 22–26 October 2018 (Participants 28) Material Conservation II – Wood, Metal, Glass and Ceramic

Module III: 2–7 December 2018 (Participants 30) Structural Conservation, Retrofit and Maintenance

Module IV: 20–25 January 2019 (Participants 30) Conservation Project Management

Module V: 24 February–1 March 2019 (Participants 32) Urban Conservation and Enabling Environment







Education

The CSMVS' Education Department is a vibrant team that conceptualises, designs and executes educational initiatives and programmes with an objective to engage audiences with cultural heritage and provide scope for enrichment through a platform for interaction and experiences.

In March 2019, CSMVS opened its new Children's Museum supported by Bank of America which aims to further enhance the objectives of the Education Department and its offerings to the public.



Projects Undertaken



Coding Culture Hackathon

As a pre-running event of the exhibition project 'Open Codes. Digital Culture Techniques' at the Goethe Institute Mumbai, CSMVS collaborated with ZKM, Karlsruhe, Germany and Goethe Institute/ MMB on Coding Culture Hackathon. The Hackathon explored the possibilities that coding can open up for the arts and creative sectors. By inviting key institutions from the Indian creative network, alongside motivated programmers, the aim was to find new forms of engagement between art and code. In Part I held in April 2018, a total of ten teams took part in the Hackathon, which brought the CSMVS and the Dr. Bhau Daji Lad City Museum together with the Indian Programmer-Scene to test new forms of cooperation. The teams developed experimental apps and websites for the expansion of museum services. Part II held in November 2018 found teams going beyond the developments of Part I in creating artworks that move in the field of tension between »Code« and »Art«.



To broaden the scope of the Museum's interaction with its neighbouring countries and strengthen ties with cultural institutions, the CSMVS announced its Southeast Asia Initiative in 2018, annually inviting a scholar from a Southeast Asian country to deliver a public lecture at the CSMVS, exploring the historical and cultural connections between the two countries, and thence explore possibilities of collaboration. The first collaboration was a result of the joint statement issued after a meeting between the Hon'ble Prime Ministers of India and Thailand in New Delhi on 17 June 2016 and the Executive Program of Cultural Exchange between the Government of the Kingdom of Thailand and the Government of the Republic of India for the years 2016–2019 encouraging cultural collaboration between the two countries. A delegation from the Fine Arts Department, Ministry of Culture, Thailand visited CSMVS on 17 January 2019 for the official signing of a Memorandum of Understanding initiating collaborative projects, including mutual exchange of educational, academic and research programmes, workshops, symposiums, exhibitions.

The CSMVS-Southeast Asia Initiative



CSMVS-Tata Trust Art Conservation Initiative Project

CSMVS and the Tata Trusts have undertaken a collaborative project under the 'Tata Trusts Art Conservation Initiative'. The purpose of this convergence is to support and train project staff, conduct training programmes and workshops in art conservation, to conduct outreach activities in institutions of neighbouring states as well as conducting field surveys and preparing proposals for conservation of the collections in these external institutions and sites. CSMVS has been selected as the zonal centre for the western region of India for this project with the states of Maharashtra, Gujarat and Goa under its project reach. Selection of external institutions for field survey from these states will be done jointly by CSMVS and Tata Trusts.



The CSMVS-DAI Kuwait Project

CSMVS and Dar al-Athar al-Islamiyyah, Kuwait have been working together towards conserving select objects from the Al-Sabah Collection following an agreement signed on 23 January 2017 with Sheikha Hussah Sabah al-Salem al-Sabah, co-owner of the Al-Sabah Collection and Director of Dar al-Athar al-Islamiyyah, Kuwait. Conservators from CSMVS made visits to Kuwait and worked in efficient tandem along with the DAI art conservators and collection care team for conservation of metal and paper objects. Following the successful completion of Phase 1 of the project in June 2018, the project was extended till March 2019.


